
## Revered teacher retires

CALVIN has farewelled its longest serving teacher at an assembly that ended with a standing ovation.

After a teaching career spanning 42 years, Mr Jack Kuilenburg, a highly respected teacher, has retired from teaching at Calvin Secondary.

In his farewell speech, Mr Kuilenburg did not exalt himself, which he easily could have done, but in his usual humble way asked for forgiveness from anyone he had hurt or offended.

Mr Kuilenburg's teaching career started in 1964 at Hobart College. He taught there for four years. He then travelled to Canada, where he

taught in a high school for eight years and at university for two years.

In 1975, he was asked to return to Tasmania and establish the Secondary School

at Calvin. He started teaching here in 1976.

Despite leaving, Mr Kuilenburg says that he will still come and visit the students to say hello. He would also like to do some relief teaching once in a while.

At Calvin, Mr Kuilenburg established a great respect from students and teachers, helping mould Calvin into the school it is today. Being synonymous with the school, he will never be forgotten, the respect for him even continuing in his absence.

One of his past students, Mr Warren Iles, now also a teacher at Calvin said: "Jack always commanded respect in his classroom. In his class you worked hard and got the best

out of yourself. It has been a privilege to be taught by Jack and then be able to work alongside him at Calvin."

Katrina Sikkema, a Year 10 student said: "He always pushed you to your highest potential and ensured that he got the best possible marks out of each one of us. I'm going to miss him greatly."

Principal Mr Ric Peterson referred to Mr Kuilenburg's retirement as like being at Donald Bradman's last innings or seeing Haley's Comet.

"If you think about Calvin, you think about Mr Kuilenburg. If you think about Mr Kuilenburg, you think about Calvin," he said.

## Support for Balinese orphanages

It was Melinda's grandparents, both born in Indonesia, who "discovered" the seven orphanages we support and the items of jewellery sold at school are brought back by them.

Melinda says that plans for the next lunchtime fundraiser have not yet been made, though she did go to Bali recently and says that she would like to become a teacher there when she leaves school.
