Sailing excursion an historic snapshot

GRADE 5 students from Collegiate went on a fantastic river trip on the Lady Nelson last month.

The students cruised slowly down the River Derwent to the casino before turning around and sailing back up the river and under the Tasman Bridge.

The purpose of this awesome trip was for students to experience what it was like for Tasmania's first settlers.

"We had a fabulous time on Her Majesty's 'Tinderbox!'" Morgan Blackburn said, referring to the nickname given to the training ship.

The replica Lady Nelson was built at Margate in 1988 and is made out of Tasmanian blue gum.

It is larger than the original Lady Nelson built in England 1793, and has a 118 horsepower engine.

The Lady Nelson was named after the wife of Vice Admiral Horatio Nelson, who was a well known English naval hero.

He fought in the Battle of Trafalgar where he lost his life.

"The excursion was great," Samantha James-Radford said.

"You could really get the feel for what it was like for the early settlers.

"I loved putting up the sails," Alice Terry said.

Students rang the ship's big gold bell eight times and sang "eight bells and all is well".
