Celebrating 75 years

THIS year sees Ogilvie High School celebrating its 75th anniversary, with numerous events being held during October.

Ogilvie High School has an excellent history and a reputation that is upheld with pride every day.

When it was officially opened by the then Tasmanian premier A.G. Ogilvie in 1937, the school was originally called New Town Commercial High School.

In 1939, following the death of Mr Ogilvie, the school formally changed its name to A.G. Ogilvie High School.

The original Ogilvie building had only eight classrooms and the Mercury newspaper of the day described the school as a first of its kind for Tasmania.

At the time there were 13 staff members and 323 students. In the first year there were 107 boys and 216 girls.

In its first year the school had only Grades 7 and 8, which were called E Class and D Class at the time. Grade 9 (C Class) was added in 1938, but there was no Grade 10 (B Class) until 1946.

During World War II Ogilvie High School supported the war effort by raising money, writing letters to soldiers, collecting books and other essentials.

By 1960 Ogilvie had stopped the enrolment of males in order to become the first all-girls public school in Tasmania.

The last of the boys left in 1963 and Ogilvie has maintained an all-girls enrolment since then.

New buildings were added in 1964, 1965, 1969, 1970, 1978, 1985 and 2005.

These additions were necessary as the school rapidly grew in numbers.

In 1970 the hostels at Ogilvie

High School and nearby New Town High School merged to become Springvale Hostel.

The building at Ogilvie that had been used as the hostel started being used as classrooms instead.

In 1991, Ogilvie High School's high standard of achievement throughout the school was recog-

nised in the selection of its first Rhodes Scholar, Dorothy Steane.

In 1999, Ogilvie had its second Rhodes Scholar, Susan Dando, followed by Jessica Trebilco as the third in 2002.

In 2010 it was decided Ogilvie would have a new canteen and student centre, which was opened in 2011.

A lot of changes have come upon the school in its 75th anniversary year.

One that the public will notice while students are out and about is the change of uniform.

Since Ogilvie first opened, it has always maintained the same uniform with only minor changes along the way.

Brown and maroon have always been the distinctive colours of the uniform.

This year the uniform changed with new jumpers in maroon, a grey skirt and a summer dress which is a blue-grey and white pinstripe.

There is also the addition of black stockings and black shoes.

There will be a three-year phasing in of the new uniform.

The school's 75th Anniversary events will run from Thursday, October 18 until Tuesday, October 23.
